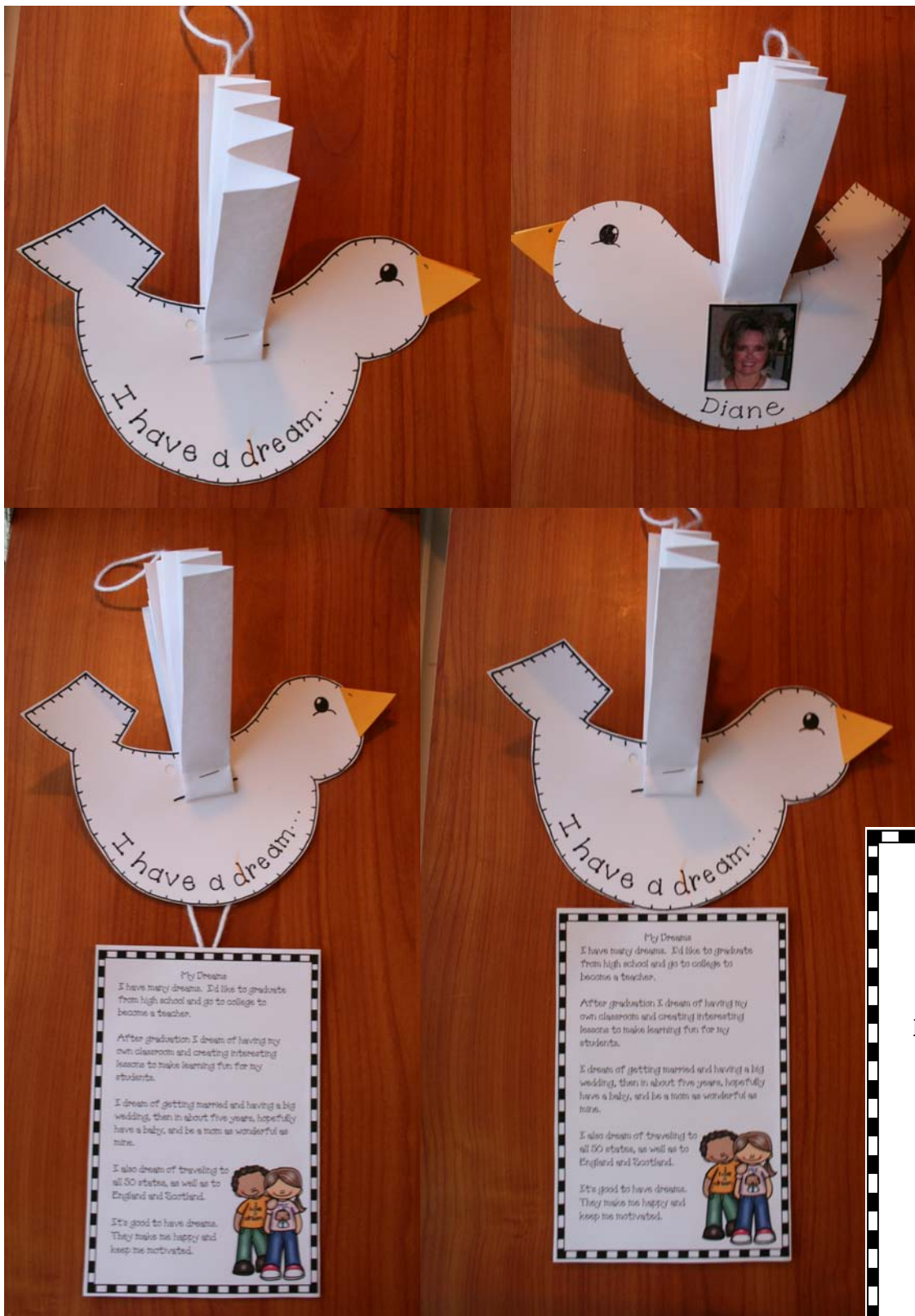

Younger kiddos can simply do the dove or write what they want to be when they grow up on the tummy of the bird.

Folding the wings provides great fine motor practice to strengthen finger and hand muscles.

For that finishing touch, add a school photo to the back.

Older students use the "stationery" worksheet to write about their dreams.

They color the picture, fold their paper over and glue it together.

You can punch a hole in the top and attach a yarn loop, connecting it to the bottom of the dove, or simply glue the bird to the top.

The back of the prompt has Langston Hughes' "Dreams" poem on it.
