



Open House

- ❖ I send out my Welcome Packet to my students the 2nd week of August inviting them to Open House.
- ❖ We have our pre-school, Y5 and Kindergarten Open House on the same night with pre-school an hour before, usually at 6:00 with Y5's and K's at 7:00.
- ❖ It's usually on a Thursday because people tend to go away on vacation on Fridays. It's usually 2 weeks before school starts.
- ❖ We have our open house before the other elementary school's all-grade open house so that it's not so scary and overwhelming with zillions of big kids running all over.
- ❖ We also have 2 busses available for them to have their 1st ride with their parents so that's not so scary as well.
- ❖ I set up my Open House like a Treasure Hunt. They have been sent the "Treasure List" and a set of 10 stickers in the mail in their packet.
- ❖ I do that in advance because I want them to look forward to the evening and get excited. I also want to see which parents are on the ball and keep track of things and will bring the "map & stickers" with them that night.
- ❖ I have extra maps, but no stickers on hand just in case. And there are ALWAYS some who don't. Sigh....
- ❖ This Treasure Hunt concept was so widely liked that most of the other K-2nd grade classes adopted it!
- ❖ It's just a fun way to make sure students find their teacher, locker, desk etc. and whatever else you want them to find.
- ❖ **A Head's Up:** You will see that I jotted down a note: "*Don't take your name tag off your locker or bulletin board*". I actually had parents doing that!
- ❖ I also added a note not to play with all the toys in my classroom. For my 1st Open House, being a rookie, I just naturally assumed that parents would be watching their children. NOT! They were in the hallway visiting with other parents while their children AND younger siblings were hauling out everything and trashing the room! What a mess I walked in on after Open House! I was there cleaning and

straightening 'til after 11:00 totally exhausted with an hour ride home yet to do.

- ❖ I revamped for next year keeping almost all of the activities out in the hallway, and that little note has worked WONDERS! Parents just needed a gentle reminder. ☺
- ❖ I have manila-envelope packets with their 1st names listed alphabetically in a plastic crate for them to pick up.
- ❖ Included here are samples for you to see of what I have inside.
- ❖ Since dinosaurs are my 1st themed science unit, I revamped a dino sheet from *Mailbox Magazine*TM to use as an icebreaker for a 1st day verbally sharing time activity.
- ❖ The author of the poem is unknown. I run it off on pink and blue copy paper and cut it into a bookmark for mom's to keep. ☺
- ❖ I also include a note about Name Tags and include their child's laminated name tag so they can write their bus number and address of where they'll be going.
- ❖ Even tho' the office has information on students galore, I like my own sheet so I don't have to bother them.
- ❖ Our principal likes our parents to sign in so he knows how many attended Open House so there's a sheet for that. It's also part of the Treasure Hunt.
- ❖ I have little signs that I laminate and put on baskets.
- ❖ In my Summer Packet Letter I tell parents they can bring school supplies in a baggy marked with their child's name to Open House. It saves me time on the 1st day from checking everyone in, and I can get a jump start on opening everything and putting the supplies in community sharing tubs so I have a basket set up for that.
- ❖ I also have a basket for them to put their "I can help!" form in. In case they forgot it, or lost it, I have sheets that they can sign up on too. I just found that sending it early as a check list is easier. It's one sheet to keep track of, and I don't have a bunch of mommies standing in line waiting to sign up on a bunch of different sheets. I've provided them for you tho' in case you like doing it that way.
- ❖ I find that if I give them just the option of YES I can donate something; I have the convenient option of assigning whatever I need. Most parents are pretty flexible about being able to bring in whatever that may be.

- I am busy working in our classroom so that it will be ready for Open House and our first day of school.
- I hope you color the frogs so you know when the big day arrives!

- Take a ride on the school bus if you want to.

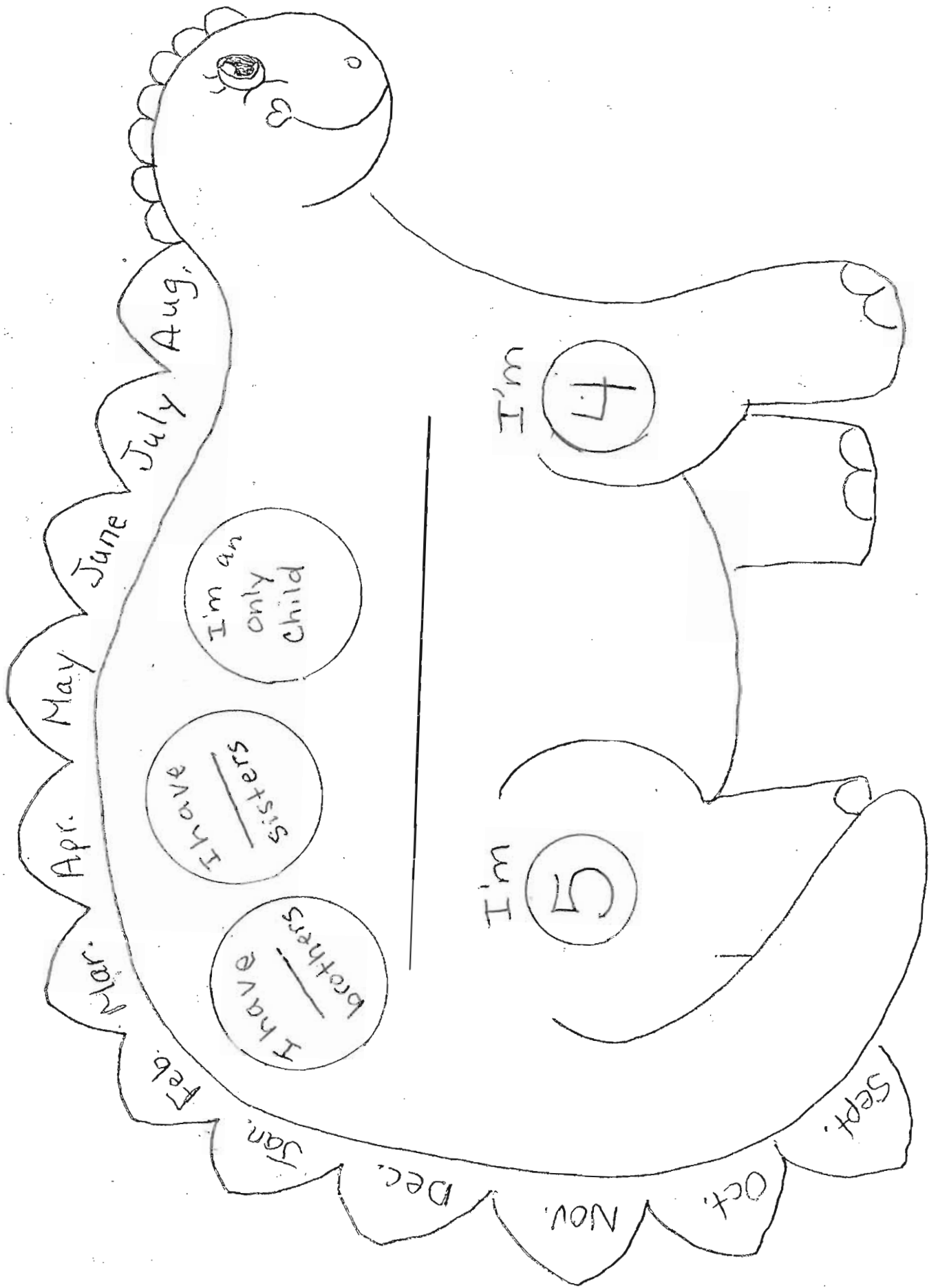

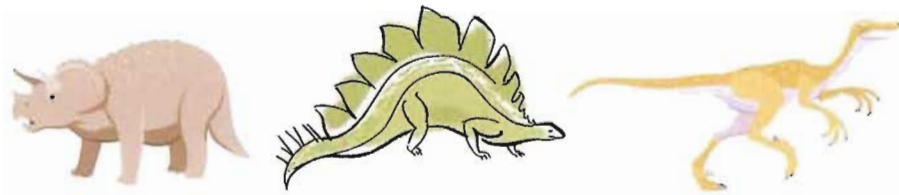

Prescription For A Great First Day Of School!

Remember to:

- Relax and Enjoy... You are making a special memory in your child's life.
- A nice bath is not only refreshing, but it soothes a child and gets them calmed down for an earlier bedtime.
- Snuggling up with them and reading a "going to school" book is a pleasurable activity. You can discuss any fears they might have. Share what school was like for you and let them know how much fun school is going to be for them.
- Lay out things the night before so you aren't rushed in the morning.
- Help build independence by allowing your child to help lay out their clothes.
- If your child is bringing a lunch, make it the night before. I used to freeze my children's juice boxes. Their drink was cold as well as keeping everything else fresh.
- Get a good night's sleep. A young child needs 10-12 hours of sleep and should be in bed no later than 8:00. It's a good idea to start getting your child ready for earlier bedtimes and waking them up earlier a few days before school starts.
- Please put your child's nametag on EVERY day for the first 3 weeks.
- Remember their backpack. Only school supplies from our list & their dinosaur sharing paper should be in it.
- Make sure their name is on their jacket, backpack, and lunch box.
- Please pin notes & lunch money to their shirt.
- Allow enough time in the morning so no one feels rushed.
- Start out the day with a nutritious breakfast.
- If they will be riding the bus it's a good idea to start right out with this routine. It helps with any Separation Anxiety a child may have. This is also the time frame when everyone is learning bus routines. If you drive them to school just because it's the "first day" or "week" of school they will have missed a lot of "how to's".
- Send them off with hugs, kisses and happy wishes.



Dear Families,
Your help is needed to complete your child's nametag.

IF YOUR CHILD WILL RIDE THE BUS AFTER SCHOOL:

- On the white label, under your child's name, please PRINT the address where the bus will take them after school—either your **home address** or the **daycare address**.
- Please print the information with a pen. We will add your child's bus number on the nametag during their first day of school.
- It is important that our transportation director, **Kurt Johnson**, has the same take-home address that you print on the nametag. If the address has changed since you completed Y5/Kindergarten enrollment forms, please contact the office (678-4181) before the 1st day of school.

IF YOUR CHILD WILL BE PICKED UP AFTER SCHOOL:

- On the white label, under your child's name, please PRINT “Picked up by” and the name(s) of the person(s) who will pick up your child after school.
- Please print the information with a pen.

IF YOUR CHILD WILL BE A WALKER AFTER SCHOOL:

- On the white label, under your child's name, please print “Walker” and the address to which your child will walk after school—either your **home address** or the **daycare address**.
- Please print the information with a pen.

For the first 4 weeks of school, please have your child wear their nametag each day. The tags are helpful to identify your child to the bus drivers, teachers, playground/cafeteria aides, and other adults at school. **TIP:** As soon as they get home, train them to pin their tag on their backpack as they put it away. That way even if you forget to put it on in the morning, we'll still have access to it.

Thanks for your cooperation in keeping your child safe and happy.

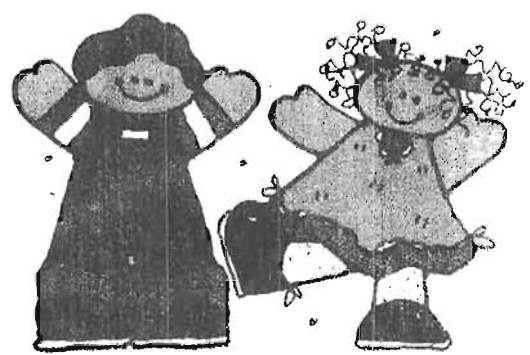
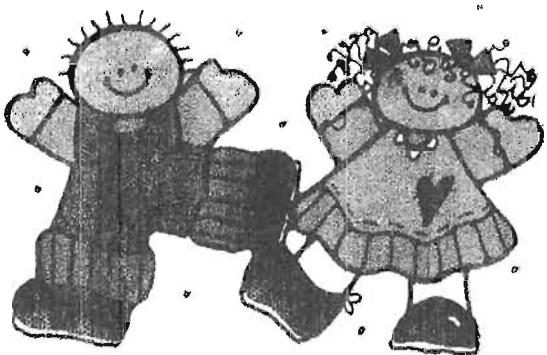

she started Young Fives today.

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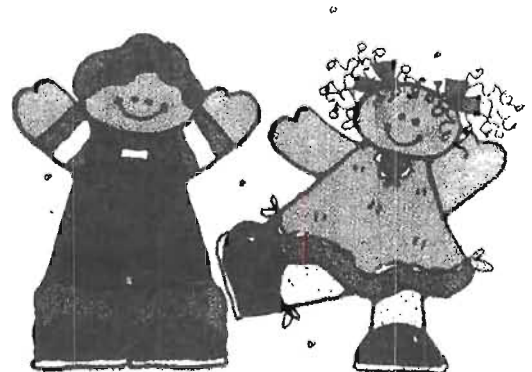
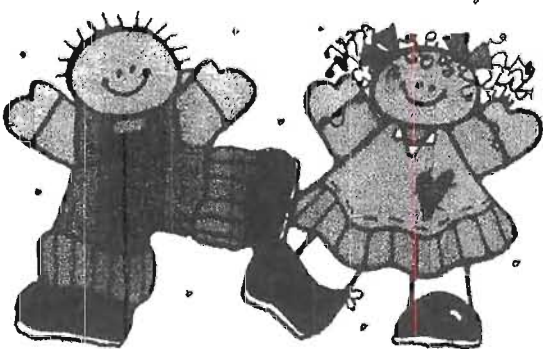


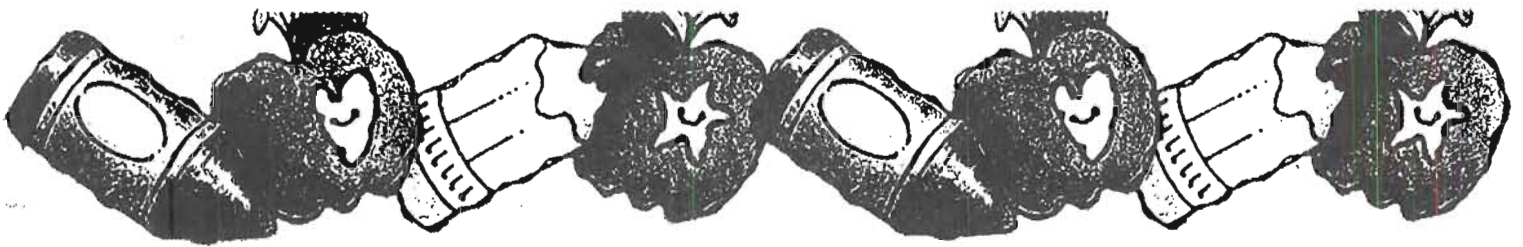
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Remember The Day You Started School?

What if I splash water on my nametag and my name disappears and no one will know who I am?

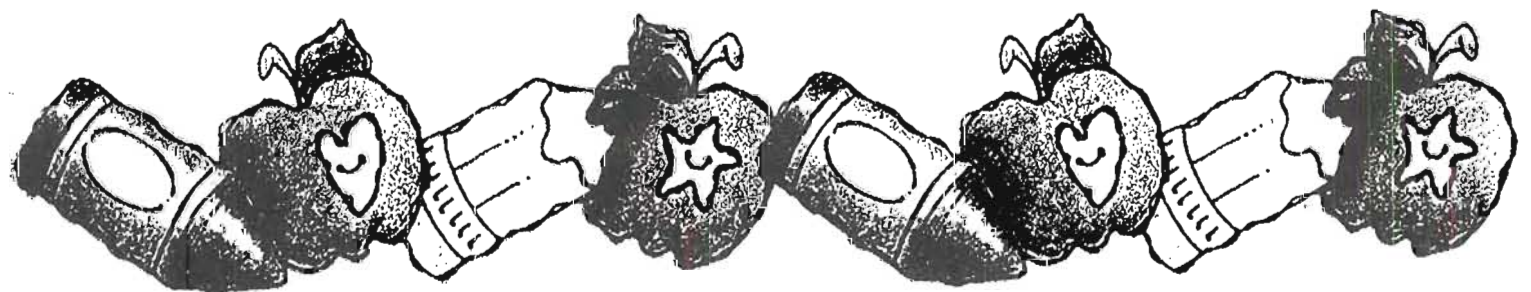
What if they mispronounce my last name and everyone laughs?

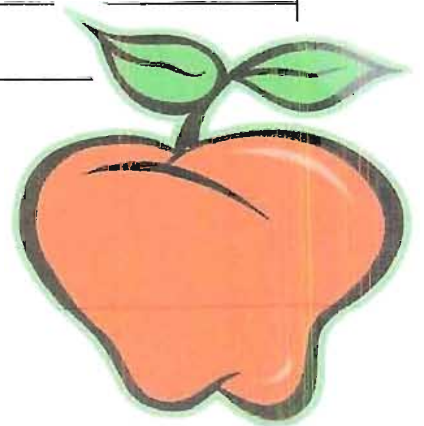
